The year 2005 was highlighted by decentralisation, EU integration and poverty. The decentralisation process, as one of the last obligations arising from the Ohrid (framework) agreement was in the focus in the first half of the year with the local elections and the transfer of authorisations. In December, the Republic of Macedonia has gained the status of a candidate country for EU membership. The country still faces "growth without employment."

In 2005, MCIC had an overall portfolio of 16 programmes with 131 projects and budget amounting to MKD 125 million.

The achieved result is a success both in terms of realising the operational plan and in comparison with the previous year. The ongoing trend is focused on "soft activities" – training, advocacy and information at expense of reducing the financial support.

The approximation towards EU significantly affects the agenda as well as the available resources, especially regarding the civil society.

MCIC's support from the Consortium for Macedonia has been further reduced (for 10%), and 2005 was the final year of the support provided by ICCO, Netherlands, one of the greatest supporters of MCIC as well as of CAID, Great Britain. The increased activities and the success in fund raising from other sources (mainly EU) contributed for diversification of MCIC support.

In 2005, MCIC was focused on reorganisation and restructuring for adjusting to the changed environment. The Social Restructuring Plan included: programme restructuring (middle-term orientation 2006-2010); innovation building (personnel development, research, new products) and improving efficiency by reducing the expenditures. The implemented measures brought to improved efficiency – reduced expenditures and reduced cost for 13 per cent.

In 2005 the existing and new partnerships were of key importance for the success. In this respect, MCIC has continued to strengthen the existing networks and to deepen the cooperation with the partners, but has also built some new successful partnerships.

WATER SUPPLY AND SANITATION



WATER SUPPLY AND SANITATION FOR COMMUNITIES

The goal of the programme is to provide drinking water and drainage of wastewaters.

In the course of 2005, the water supply and sanitation was provided for 8 villages with 4.138 residents in Macedonia. The total value of the projects is MKD 41.755.698. MCIC participated with MKD 22.302.132, or around 53%.

ENABLING THE COMMUNITIES AND INSTITUTIONS

The goal of the programme is to enable the communities and institutions to organize and manage developmental initiatives. Total of 224 representatives of the local selfgovernments and citizen associations participated in the trainings and visits for experience exchange.



The Positive - Will Always be an Example for the Others

The municipality of Lozovo and its mayor, Jordan Pavlov welcomed the representatives of municipalities of Mogila, Staro Nagoricane and Zelino, showing the fruits of their hard work. "The local government has implemented more than 15 projects, six of which are implemented without donor assistance, but with the contribution of the inhabitants and the municipality," mayor Pavolv told his guests. The municipality also cooperates with around thirty small and medium local enterprises.

The hosts organised a visit to some of the realised projects. "The visit was very useful for our municipality. I was mostly impressed by the construction material factory IGM "Dzumajlija" which is the largest facility in this municipality. The visit is well organized both for exchange of information and sharing experiences with the other municipalities", said Ico Veljanovski from the municipality of Mogila.

"This is our fourth visit of this kind already and there is always something new to see or hear," said Lazar Dimitrijevic from the municipality of Staro Nagoricane. "Seeing the activities of the municipality we are already having ideas how to improve our work. We saw two big companies which are successful and have large number of employees," he added.

These visits are always a good way to see how the local authorities approach and resolve the existing problems, so MCIC organises these meetings in order to facilitate the work of the municipalities through direct contacts, exchange of information and experience.





HEALTH AND EDUCATION



APPLIED EDUCATION FOR YOUNG ROMA

The goal of the programme is to improve the inclusion of young Roma in the primary education and to increase the employment possibilities of Roma youth. The programme was implemented in 11 towns, including 15 primary schools where 3.454 Roma children attend the classes, which is 21 percent of the total number of pupils. Also, a research was conducted in order to explore the educational background of Roma people.

My Friend

Everyone has own holiday, own D day, and for Roma this day is April 8 – World Roma Day. The nobleness, the good things that one makes for the others is the best way to get closer to the other people and to show one's own greatness – this was the force that guided the jury when presenting the awards to the pupils from the primary and secondary schools in Macedonia that wrote essays on the following topics: "To be Roma: at home, in school, in the society" and "Roma in 21st century: how they live and how the others perceive them."

"This has been the first time for me to write about Roma people," said Olivera Doneva, a pupil in the 1st year in the high school DSU "Ljupco Santov" from Kocani, who has been among the awarded. "I chose the topic - Who created the holidays. I am writing about a young Roma girl and her plans and desires about the future. In fact, the girl in the story is a real person; she has been my friend from the early childhood. She is the only Roma girl to have continued her education and she is a student in the 1st year in the same high school where I study. Her wish to carry on with the education was big despite the financial problems. Anyone deserves an opportunity in life!" added Olivera.

The selected works will be published in a special publication in several languages and it will be distributed to the primary and secondary schools and the public libraries in the country.

Who Created the Holidays

(excerpt from the awarded work)

"...it suddenly became clear to me why (mum and dad) left us with grandma early in the morning and took us late at night; why my four little sisters cried all the time till they were gone. Only I knew how to calm them, I the eldest one, barely eight years old. I made a decision. I will put an end to all this. I will finish school with highest grades. I will show what I can. I will help my parents. I will be a role model."



EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME GENERATION

MCIC is the founder of the Macedonian Enterprise

Development Foundation (MEDF).

MEDF implements the planned activities foreseen in the Strategic Plan via the Financial Services Programme (PFU), Non-financial Services Programme (NFU), Sub-sector Development Programme (PSR) and Platform for Small and Medium Enterprise Development Programme (PRP).

Popova Kula

At No 1 on the Wine Boulevard which passes by Demir Kapija, on the old road that used to connect Skopje and Thessalonica, there is the winery called "Popova Kula". The impressive stone tower gives you an incredible view on the valley where the wineyards and the wine had the central role. At the time when we visited Popova Kula there was a purchase of grapes taking place there. The winery purchases grapes from the small producers in the Tikves region, and there are about 20,000 of them there.

"This is a pilot project", says one of the investors, Jordan Trajkov.

"Our vision is to invest in 10 wine cellars in Macedonia, especially in interesting and attractive places like these. We believe that this is a good way where you should not invest", he added. In these people's vision, Inteko (the company that manages Popova Kula) shall be the manager of the wine cellars.


Popova Kula is going to employ seven people and, after the start of the bottling process, four more people are going to be employed. The winery's capacity is 200,000 liters, and 19 investors, including the domestic as well as the investors from the USA and France, are a part of the project.

We are leaving Popova Kula. We are leaving the No 1 on the Wine Boulevard. We hope that there will be new numbers on this boulevard, and that this people's vision will become reality. Because this reality will bring the town at the foot of Popova Kula as well as the whole region prosperity.

Bank Decentralisation

MEDF continues to build the capacities of the banking staff through training courses, especially the staff that is directly connected with the crediting of micro and small businesses.

These training courses are to support the process of decentralization of credit granting, that according to the participants at the training courses, shall contribute to building a different image of the banks, making them more accessible for the clients. Decentralization means that the banking staff at the branch offices can decide on whether the bank is going to significantly cut down the time needed for the bank to make a decision, and the clients are going to be more satisfied.



FINANCIAL SERVICES

The goal of the programme is improvement of the access to financial services for development of micro and small businesses.

The 2005 program covered 62 small enterprises and 564 micro entrepreneurs. The total payment amounted to MKD 217,951,784.00.

NON-FINANCIAL SERVICES

The goal of the programme is strengthening the capacity of the players in the SME sector. In 2005, programme and organizational support was provided to: ZZP Kumanovo. ZZP Agroprodukt – Stip, RPS Matica – Stip, ESA Tetovo and ESA Gostivar.




CIVIL SOCIETY AND DEMOCRACY

PLATFORM OF THE CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANISATIONS IN MACEDONIA

The goal of the programme is establishing a mechanism that will contribute for improving and enabling the environment for the civil society organizations. In the course of 2005, the report on the Civil Society Index in Macedonia was prepared and the Fifth NGO Fair - Forum of Civil Society was organised under the slogan "The Centre is Where You Are." Total of 228 civil society organisations participated at the Fair and there were





Civil Society in Macedonia Between Perception and Reality

The Civil Society Index Report in Macedonia was a result of the first comprehensive research on civil society in the country.

The report was also the main topic of discussion at the first national conference on the civil society.

"The report can help us see where we are, what we are and where we are heading", said at the beginning of the conference, Saso Klekovski, MCIC Executive Director. He pointed out several findings of the Report. The largest success in terms of the impact, according to him, is the part of women's empowerment. However, one of the concerns highlighted in the Report was the ratio between urban and rural areas which amounts 10:1. "I believe we have to look at these gaps realistically in order not to stumble and be entrapped because this is a very deep gap between urban and rural Macedonia. I would like to emphasize this gap, even maybe deliberately, as very important for further observations not only in the structure, but also in the civil society in general, where improvements should be made", added Klekovski.

"I always considered that we are too strict and too critical in the assessment and personally I have a better perception of the civil sector than maybe its actors have", said Ljiljana Popovska, Macedonian MP. I believe the total score for the structure should be higher. If we talk about the range of civil society organisations, the volunteerism, the infrastructure, it is much better than we have observed or what we want to have and sometimes I think we have greater wishes in comparison to what we can objectively assess," she added.

According to Flora Latifi, advisor to the President of Macedonia for civil society organisations, the Report is significant due to two things. "First it gives the opportunity to see an image or a real condition of our civil society organizations, and second, it encourages us to undertake activities for the development of civil society in Macedonia."

The results of the report will be part of the Global Civil Society Index report of Civicus.

CIVIC WORLD

The goal of the programme is providing information and improving the communication with the citizens' associations, other players and public about the work of the civic associations and the civil society development. Eleven issues of the magazine and five issues of the Civic Practices covering various topics were published.



The goal of the program is strengthening the organizational capacity of the civil society organizations in Macedonia.

The 2005 programme covered a total of 474 participants in the training and consultation process, 127 of which in the regular (standard) courses, 347 in the tailor-made courses and workshops as well as 120 participated in preparing the annual balance sheets.





Managing a Non Profit Organisation

"Having in mind my extensive experience, I have to admit that I really needed this type of training. It was comprehensive and I gained new knowledge, which I already started implementing in managing the ensemble." These are the words of Dragan Georgiev, member of the folklore ensemble "Bucim" from Radovis, and one of the 14 participants of the training managing a non profit organisation, for the leaders of the civil society organisations aimed at providing managing know-how. The participants had an opportunity to learn about the management of a civil society organisation, the concept of institutional development and organisational enhancement, integrated organisational model, management style, strategic management, managing changes, organisational learning, organisational set-up, organisational culture and human resources management. The training applies the concept of institutional development and organisational enhancement, which is especially important both for the newly established civil society organisations and for organisations that work in this sector for a longer period of time, as they lack strategic planning and organisational development, while the managing and executive positions are not distinguished, discouraging the development of civil society in Macedonia.

CIVIL SOCIETY AND DEMOCRACY



STRENGTHENING OF STRATEGIC CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANISATIONS

The goal of the programme is strengthening the organisational capacities of strategic civil society organisations.

Participants in the programme are seven organisations: Polio plus – post polio support group, the First Children's Embassy in the World "Megjasi", Movement of Ecologists in Macedonia - DEM, Association of Women's Organisation of Macedonia - SOZM, Association of Democratic Initiatives, Gostivar, Centre for Civic Initiative, Prilep and OHO Skopje. On-the-job one-month training was organised for the activists from "Megjasi", SOZM, DEM, Polio Plus and OHO.

ADVISORY CENTRES FOR CITIZENS

The goal of the program is providing improved information and raising the awareness of the citizens for exercising their rights.

Total of 538 appeals, requests and demands were prepared, expert assistance was provided in 221 cases, 318 documents were completed on various grounds and 132 working meetings were realised with the representatives of the social welfare centres, police, local self-government, basic courts, records offices etc. The programme is supported by MCIC and managed by HDZR "Mesecina".

CIVIL SOCIETY AND DEMOCRACY AWARD AWARD FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT "GERT JAN VAN APELDOORN"

The goal of the awards is to support citizens and organizations that give special contribution to local and national initiatives for civil society development and democracy, i.e. for sustainable development in Macedonia.

Winners of the Awards for Civil Society and Democracy are: Ecological Association "Vila Zora" from Veles for long-lasting contribution; the Women's Organisation of Sveti Nikole municipality and South East European University for the achievements in the previous year and the Macedonian Association for Struggle Against Children's Cancer and Leukemia "Peperutka" for their publicly visible work and informative aspect of their activities.

Humanitarian organisation "El Hilal" and the Union of Women's Organisations of Macedonia were awarded the Award for sustainable development "Gert Jan van Apeldoorn" for long-lasting contribution; the Foundation for Small and Medium Enterprises Development from Bitola and Mile Stojkovski were awarded for their achievements in the previous year.



PAGES OF MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

The goal of the program is to provide improved information to the public about the inter-ethnic relations in Macedonia and to influence the media to report on the inter-ethnic relations in an objective and comprehensive way.

By May 2005, when the programme was completed, 20 "joint pages" were published. The survey showed that 29 percent of the participants had at least a slight change in how they perceive the events. A study visit was realised in South Africa focused on bilingual reporting and role of media in reconciliation process in a post-conflict society.





BRIDGING RELIGIONS IN MACEDONIA

The goal of the programme was to increase the mutual understanding between the religious communities and as well as to enhance the understanding of the Macedonian public about them.

The final workshop was held in the presence of representatives from the religious communities – members of the Steering Group and the PRM's Publishing Council as well as MCIC's representatives. Six lectures were organised at the Theology Faculty as well as the Faculty of Islamic Science.

RE-SOCIALISATION OF EX-COMBATANT

The goal of this programme is to re-socialise the former participants in the military activities in the Macedonian conflict from 2001, from the both sides - the government security forces (the Police and the Army) and the members of the National Liberation Army (NLA), by providing direct assistance (basic skills training, professional and on-the-job training) and capacity building of their associations.

One of the courses, managing a project cycle, was organized for 21 members of both associations. They also received technical equipment.

CROSS-SECTOR PROGRAMMES







Say OK for MK

"Say OK for MK" is a continuation of the activity "Say Something Good About Macedonia" and was another opportunity for inclusion of Macedonian citizens in the process of approaching towards the European Union. A survey showed that a high percentage of 91,2 % of the citizens, would like to see Macedonia as part of the European family, while 57.2% of the citizens said they would support this initiative in various ways.

The citizens sent cards to the Government and the members of EU Ministerial Council. "Say OK for MK" they said. The writing and sending of these cards took place during the NGO Fair.

This civic initiative is yet another opportunity for the citizens to do something on their own to help or to get involved in the process of Macedonia's EU integration. This is why the Macedonian Centre for International Cooperation, Forum Centre for Strategic Research and Documentation and Search for Common Ground together with the citizens have sent the message "Say OK for MK!"

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMMES

BALKAN NETWORK FOR CIVIL SOCIETY DEVELOPMENT

The goal of the program is to increase individual and organizational capacities of relevant civil society organizations (CSO) and their cooperation in the Balkans.

The programme organised and/or supported two trainings, four exchange visits, conference, a publication, monthly newsletter, web site (with new database) and regular weekly alerts.

REGIONAL CROSS-BORDER COOPERATION

The goal of the programme is to improve the cross-boundary cooperation by increasing the cooperation between the local authorities and civil society organisations from the three cross-border regions in Albania, Kosovo and Macedonia.

Three trainings and one exchange visit were realised. The regular monthly electronic bulletin was published, with reports from the members of the Coordination Body.





Example of the Three Countries' Politics

"We don't believe in politics, we believe in civil society. I believe in Macedonian civil society sector and in MCIC," Redzep Shehu, coordinator of the Institute for Democracy and Mediation in the Kuks region, Albania, told us in the discussion we had in Skopje, during the Project Cycle Management Training.

The Gostivar-Kuks-Prizren, Dragas triangle is the focus of the international cooperation program, including civil organizations as well as local governments form the cities in this region.

"I believe that various programs will emerge from this program and that the people from this region will present their joint projects", said Shehu. "We are willing to create a pilot-program with our projects", he added.

Redzep Shehu hoped that the program could be the first step in the opening of the region. Starting with solving the basic problem, passing the border, he hoped that other relations could also develop. "In order to come to Macedonia, the Kuks inhabitants need 20 hours and 30 Euros. If the border crossing near Kuks was opened, their trip to Macedonia would have been shortened to 2.5 hours," Shehu explained. "If someone travels to Macedonia once a year just to visit the country, imagine the businessmen who need to do this several times a month! At the end of the day, if we meet more often we don't have to like each other but we won't hate each other too", said Redzep Shehu.

STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENT OF MCIC

COOPERATION

MCIC cooperation was focused on the domestic organisations and institutions, agencies - members of the World Council of Churches and other foreign organisations. The cooperation with the local civil society organisations (mainly in the scope of the Civic Platform of Macedonia) and the local self-government units has been with lower intensity, but by the end of the year the Programme for 2006-2007 as well as the Report for 2004 were adopted. MCIC continued the rhythm of co-operation with SSC and the Consortium for Macedonia. The Consortium for Macedonia held its 12th meeting in May in Skopje. Participants from DCA, NCA, Christian Aid, EED and MCIC attended the meeting, which focused on the Report on MCIC's work for 2004; the progress in 2005 programmes, analysis of the context and the actors, MCIC's strategic orientation as well as the future of the Consortium. MCIC Executive Director, Saso Klekovski was also invited to be part of the governmental delegation, which handed over the questionnaire in Brussels to the European Commission as part of the EU integration process.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

MCIC bulletin was published 11 times as well as two issues of the 2004 MCIC Annual Report for the public (short and long version).

There were a total of 324 appearances in the media in 2005. 237 of the appearances in the printed media were paid advertisements, while 37 were articles, short information or interviews with information on MCIC work.

FUNDRAISING

MCIC has prepared several funding applications and the following have been approved: Network to Network by EU/CARDS programme together with the five regional partners; EAR has approved the application Supporting the Activities of Minority Groups prepared by ADI, where MCIC is a partner; Technical Assistance to the Civil Society Unit within the Government, in partnership with COWI from Denmark and together with INTRAC from Great Britain. Also, applications for the members of the Consortium were developed and approved: NCA (MSM and Water Supply and Sanitation for Communities), as well as the financing provided by NCA for the Balkan Network for Civil Society Development and by DCA for the Platform for the Civic Associations in Macedonia.

MCIC has applied to other public calls: Framework Agreements for EU Agreements, in partnership with three consortiums: MDF (Netherlands), Ecorys (Netherlands), and Italtrend (Italy) (ongoing); Roma Educational Fund (REF); Let's Learn Together (ongoing).

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INDEPENDENT AUDITING REPORT

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Report of the Auditors

To the Macedonian Center for International Cooperation

We have audited the accompanying balance sheet of the Macedonian Center for International Cooperation (MCIC) as of 31 December 2005 and the related statements of revenue and expenses and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements, set out on pages 2 to 15, are the responsibility of the MCIC's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

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
